

KEFERSTEINIA MYSTACINA, n. sp.†

This is a very curious new *Kefersteinia*, having the general habit of the common *K. graminea*. The flowers are yellowish-green, as also is the blade of the lip. The callus and stalk of the lip are white, with purple dots, as well as the column. The chief and very curious feature lies in the blade of the lip, which is broken up into numerous fringes, which are quite peculiar. It was discovered at St. Alban's, Hertfordshire, at Mr. Sander's, under masses of Columbian Orchids sent thither by late poor Falkenberg, taken over to Zürich, and carefully brought to flower by Herr Consul Kienast-Zölly, who is inferior to nobody in enthusiasm for Orchid species, and even more so for their varieties. *H. † *Kefersteinia mystacina*, n. sp. — Omnino *Kefersteinia graminea*, sed labelli callo transverse utrinque obtusangulo multo latiori, medio antice minutissime obtusangulo, ima umbone supersidente, cruribus lateralibus assurgentibus; lamina triangula obtusa in lacinias, longe laceras soluta; columna sine curina sub fovea. — *Zygopetalum mystacinum*.
