Pleurothallis cleistogama Luer, sp. nov.

Ety .: From the Latin cleistogamus, "cleistogamous," fertilized with a closed flower.

Species haec P. ruscifoliae (Jacq.) R.Br. affinis, sed flores minoribus incrassatis cleistogamis, petalis latioribus triangularibusque et labello ad medium angulato differt.

Plant medium in size to large, epiphytic, caespitose; roots slender. Ramicauls slender, erect, 7-35 cm long, with a tubular sheath near the middle and 2-3 other sheaths at the base. Leaf erect, coriaceous, elliptical, acute, more or less slightly acuminate, 6-17 cm long, 1-4 cm wide, the base acuminate into a distinct petiole ca. 1 cm long. Inflorescence a fascicle of a few or several, simultaneous, single flowers (infrequently 2-flowered), from a spathe ca. 7 mm long at the base of the petiole; peduncles 1-3 mm long; floral bracts thin, 2-3 mm long; pedicels 4-5 mm long; ovary 2 mm long; sepals pale yellow-green, glabrous, the dorsal sepal ovate, acute, acuminate, concave below the middle, 4-8 mm long, 2-3 mm wide, 3-veined; the lateral sepals connate into a narrowly ovate, acute synsepal, 4-8 mm long, 0.5-1 mm wide, faintly 3-veined; lip light green, ovate, acute to subacute, 1-1.5 mm long, 1-1.25 mm wide, with the disc shallowly channeled between semierect sides, sometimes acutely flexed, the base broadly truncate, concave on the end, hinged to the convex tip of the column-foot; column semiterete, 1.75 mm long, the foot thick, the anther, rostellum and stigma apical.

PANAMA: Chiriquí: Bajo Grande, above Cerro Punta, alt. 2400 m, 13 Feb. 1985, C. Luer, J. Luer, R. Dressler & K. Dressler 10527 (Holotype: MO).

This taxon is little more than a cleistogamous form of the ubiquitous *P. ruscifolia*, but it differs from the latter in the following: the flowers are smaller with thickened sepals that are proportionately wider; thick, narrowly triangular petals that are wider; and an oblong, acute lip with acutely angled margins above the middle. The base is distinctly concave and articulated with a bulbous tip of the column-foot.
